Hi everyone!

I'm really sorry for not having written for such a long time. Perhaps it's because life as a single girl isn't always that exciting as some books would have you believe! But I really enjoyed getting the newsletters. After having received some of them I took out all our old trip diaries from trips out West and canoe trips up North - revelling in nostalgia reading them again. Those years really were good years, and whenever I think about them (which is quite often, by the way) I'm glad and thankful for having been able to participate.



My job has become a real routine. The thought of teaching till I'm about 60 sometimes scares me. But then there really isn't any other alternative. On the other hand, the vacations are quite a good recompensation for getting your nerves frayed at dealing with "our next generation" for much of the year. The last years I spent them more or less alternating between the Soviet Union and Israel (isn't that a nice combination?) and this time I'm back in the good old U.S.A. to visit my sister and her family, playing the "funny aunt from Germany" to my niece and nephew. I find it rather nice to be back - things (except for prices) really haven't changed that much in the last six and a half years. Sooner or later I am going to spend a whole summer vacation here - most likely renting a camper and travelling in the New England States, which I don't know at all.

Nearly two years ago I took up violin playing again and joined a lay orchestra. We give about four or five concerts a year and the whole thing really is fun (even though my neighbors don't care for my practicing too much, but they should just be happy that I'm not playing the trumpet!). I moved into a bigger apartment in the same building, and after a noisy day at school I'm really looking forward to spending a quiet evening at home more than anything else. To the consternation of all my students I still don't have a television set (they just can't imagine what I'm doing with my evenings without having a little square screen to stare into) and am not planning on getting one. I'm quite positive, that a lot of the problems that we are having with our kids (mainly concentration inability) comes from the fact that they spend up to five hours every day watching one silly show after the other. If asked, most of them are quite incapable of telling you, what it really was they saw. The fact that they seem to be getting more and more incapable of really listening to something makes teaching them quite a chore at times. I bought some easy Dr. Seuss books to take back home and hope that they like working with them. I'll have to take my class of 7th graders to a week long class trip in May again and dread it quite a bit, but fortunately we have another week of vacation coming up right after that, and that should give us enough time to recuperate. And so far I have only three smokers in my class I have to really watch out for. I hope I catch one of them the very first day and can send him home, then. That usually keeps the rest of the class in line. (I am a real meany!!)

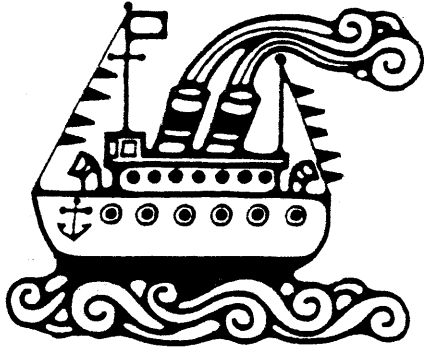
So much from me. I did enjoy reading about all your activities and about all the new Fussgangers that have arrived since I left and send my very best wishes to all of you.

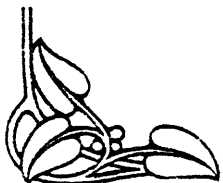


ST. ANTHONY PARK, ST. PAUL "Neighbors Are Hooked on Burning Wood for Fuel" read the headline of an article in the March 1979 issue of the St. Anthony Park BUGLE. The following is an excerpt from that article about Paul and Sue Stegmeir.

"Paul and Sue Stegmeir have managed to cut eighty per cent off their heating bill - the pay off for a little extra work cutting, splitting and hauling wood." Their first wood burning stove was installed in the basement family room. From there they added a Thermograte glass door fireplace in the living room. Next they converted the old central heating boiler to wood and installed a supplemental gas boiler. The system is automatic and will switch over to gas if the wood runs out. However, it rarely does as they keep the wood supply up. Kristin (12) and Jodi (9) both help with the wood hauling.

"In 1977 Paul left the University and became one of the founders of The Energy Shed, Inc., a locally based firm dealing in energy conservation and alternative energy products. His work allows him to spend full time on the promotion of wood energy usage and energy conservation in general." He serves on several national boards and committees and spends considerable time on the speaking circuit. He also gives a five minute program weekly on WCCO radio aired Sunday afternoon.

The November BUGLE had another article about Paul announcing a presentation he would be giving in St. Anthony Park at a home improvement seminar - "Selecting Your Woodburning Appliance and Using It Right." The article was accompanied by a photograph of Paul.
